




- A farmers market is a public place where vendors sell their locally grown or handmade products.
- Many markets carry everything from fruits and vegetables, to baked goods, meats, eggs, flowers, arts and crafts and ready to eat food.
- The best time to shop at a farmers market is usually during peak harvest season for farmers.
- According to the Farmers Market Coalition, about 15% of farmers markets stay open during the winter months.
- North Dakota has more than 50 farmers markets in the state.
- The states with the most farmers markets in them include: Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, California, Kentucky, New York, Iowa, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts.

 Farmers markets help bring business to the community and help create jobs.

• Farmers markets are essential because they provide affordable retail spaces for local and small producers.

 The first farmers market opened in Egypt more than 5000 years ago.

 The first U.S. farmers market began in Lancaster, Pennsylvania in 1730.
 This market is still open today.












BUILD YOUR OWN BOOTH

GARPEN IN A GLOVE

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Label each finger with the type of seeds that you will put in it.
- 2. Take two cotton balls and dip them in water. Remove excess water by squeezing the cotton balls.
- 3. Place two-three seeds in each cotton ball and put them in the fingers of the glove.
- 4. Twist-tie the glove with a pipecleaner.
- 5. Tape or hang the glove in a sunny/warm spot and watch the seeds sprout.

OBSERVATIONS

Record the growth of the seeds. Which grows first? Which took the longest to sprout?

Two-three days after the seedlings sprout, cut off the tips of the fingers and plant the seedlings, cotton ball and all into dirt.

If you leave the seedlings in the glove, they will eventually run low of air, water and nutrients.


