What is SCBGP?

Specialty crops are defined as "fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits, horticulture, and nursery crops (including floriculture)." For a list of eligible and ineligible commodities, visit www.nd.gov/ndda/scbgp. Please note that hemp is not considered a "specialty crop."

Who is Eligible?

To be eligible for a grant, the project(s) must "solely enhance the competitiveness of U.S. or U.S. territory grown specialty crops in either domestic or foreign markets." Projects must also benefit more than one commercial product (e.g., ABC Company brand), organization, or individual. Additional information can be found at www.nd.gov/ndda/scbgp.



Application Process

Proposals will be accepted from non-profit organizations, producer organizations, government agencies, universities, and other organizations related to North Dakota's specialty crop industry. Individuals, individual producers, for-profit businesses, or commercial entities may submit proposals. However, the project must focus on research, education, or demonstration and must benefit the specialty crop industry in a manner that can be replicated by other organizations. These projects are 2 years in length.
